

Horsforth WWI Trail

In the July Issue of Grove Vine, we gave information on each of those named on the Memorial Brass in the Church and who had given their lives in service of their country. Steve Brown of Horsforth Museum and Mark Saville have worked together to produce further information, including a leaflet on the Horsforth WWI Trail.

The Trail features premises linked to World War One and personnel and those premises demonstrated their link for a week in August. The displays are to be shown again in those same premises from Saturday 1st to Sunday 9th November. The Trail is quite straightforward and relatively easy to follow the information boards linking people and events.

Caring Together in Woodhouse and Little London

I am writing to thank your congregation, at Grove Methodist Church, for the abundance of lovely harvest foodstuffs that were collected and given to our charity for older people. I came back after a long weekend, and all the fresh produce had been distributed to older people but the tinned and dried goods looked lovely and we will be distributing them to some very vulnerable people, who are not coping too well (and they are mostly elderly men!). They will be very grateful for this donation.

We may keep back some of the tinned items for our Christmas parcels for our oldest members; this is something we like to do every Christmas and is always much appreciated by recipients.

Also, a few lines to explain our work with older people.

We are a small charity, working with hundreds of older people, living in their own homes in inner-city Leeds. We offer a wide range of activities and support and advice services. Our main objective is to help older people who are lonely and isolated. We have 20 years experience of supporting older people and working collaboratively with other agencies who are concerned for the welfare of older people. We currently employ 6 staff – 3 full time and 3 part time and we have around 100 volunteers who assist with many aspects of the work. Thank you all for your kindness.

Exploring New Horizons

Since I joined Tenzing Explorers last September, I have participated in a number of activities which otherwise I would never have had the chance to do. These range from gill scrambling in Barbondale (near Kirkby Lonsdale), to piloting a glider over Sutton Bank and the Kilburn White Horse. These experiences, whilst completely different, were both amazing! The gliding was nothing like I had ever experienced and being able to see how the glider responded when I (or the pilot/instructor) nudged the controls was breath-taking.



In my fairly short time with the Explorers I have also been able to build and sail coracles. These were made from plastic piping and plastic sheet and we tested them on the Leeds-Liverpool Canal where, surprisingly, they floated whilst being a little unstable! Despite this no one managed to fall out or capsize the coracles, showing that the design was sound even if it needed a little improvement.

Later in the year, we went fishing, in a fish farm at Kilnsey. I had never fished before but we were fishing in a small pond crammed with hundreds of trout so it was inevitable we would catch something. The next week we took our catch and cooked them in newspaper on a fire – and they tasted much better than I had expected. The same could not be said when we cooked meal worm pancakes. Once you got over the fact that you were

eating worms, the taste was bearable but the texture made for interesting eating.

My first year culminated with a fantastic camp at Kandersteg International Scout Camp in Switzerland. And the next few months look packed with great activities – starting with a canoeing expedition in Scotland.

The Grove Church Council, 8th October 2014

Twenty four members were present and a further eleven members sent apologies.

In reviewing church officers, Council noted that several people had expressed an interest in the role of **data base secretary** and spoken to Barbara Collis. However, there is still a need for **volunteers** with basic computer skills, for co-ordinating use of the **overhead projector at services other than on Parade Days** if this is requested by the preacher. It was agreed that a second request would be placed in Grove Vine.

In Matters Arising from the previous meeting, an update was given on the completion of **Centre building work** to make the premises more effective in meeting the needs of young people and children. The Property Committee took the opportunity whilst builders were on site to undertake necessary additional tasks, the overall cost is likely to be around £8,000 - £10,000 above the previously agreed figure of £35,000. This extra work includes: update of old and unsafe water heater, replacement of inefficient wall heaters in Activity Room, replacement of dangerous entrance and fire exit doors in Activity Room, renewal of leaking soil stack, redecoration of new cupboards and male/female toilets and placement of acoustic panels/notice boards in the Activity Room as an outcome of research on reducing unacceptable noise levels and as agreed by Church Council some

time ago.

Items raised by committees included:

A trial discussion opportunity on service themes to be held after morning worship on 23.11.14 to see how this Moving Forward Together suggestion works in practice. (Worship Consultation)

Membership standing at 170 and adherents at 122. (Pastoral)

Appreciation for the work of Kathryn Bussey on her retirement from J Team. (Church Life)

A plea made that anyone intending to make use of the **Charity**

Window in 2015 should take their request to Barbara Buckley as soon as possible. (Church & Society)

The presentation of a Statement of Income and Expenditure for the year ending 31.08.14 indicated a **deficit** of £1,573. (Finance)

Repairs to the stained glass **windows** and **alterations to pews** for increased disabled access proceeding, marking of **parking bays** agreed and need for a new church **boiler** identified. (Property)

The **draft Annual Report** for the year ending 31st August 2014 was tabled for information and a request made that any updating/amendment/additions by appropriate representatives should reach the Council Secretary by 31st October 2014 so that the Charity Commission deadline for submission of the report might be achieved.

Agreement was reached that donations to **Connexional charities** should be as follows: Methodist Fund for Church Property £100, the Fund for support of Presbyters and Deacons £100 and the Methodist Ministers' Housing Society £100.

Important issues from the District included information on the **proposed Circuit merger**. After discussion it was felt that now was the time for **everyone** to discuss the matter openly, honestly and transparently with members of Council and those not on Council. **Everyone** is encouraged to give their views to the minister and/or Circuit Representatives as a second Circuit meeting to discuss the issue will be held at the end of November. Representatives include the Senior Church Steward and Treasurer. (For those interested, a copy of the full Church Council minutes is pinned to the Narthex noticeboard under 'Church Items')

Under **Any Other Business**, items included :

- Agreement that the church will become a **Fairtrade** organisation in view of other members of Churches Together already having agreed.

- A donation of £1,000 to be made to ‘**Partner a Project in Uganda**’, All We Can (formerly MRDF), as requested by last year’s General Church Meeting and previously agreed by Church Council.
- On careful consideration, the refusal to a **request from KPP Architects**, Town Street, **to purchase part of the church garden** so that the company might extend its offices.
- On safety grounds, agreement to switch off the lift when not in use and display a notice to that effect.

Bible Society – Pass It On Campaign

A recent survey by the Bible Society showed that 80% of parents are keen for their children to know stories from the bible, and to assist them have created a modern computer app which can be downloaded from biblesociety.org.uk/biblebedtime-wia

The app allows parents to pass on the stories they learned when they were children in a very modern way. Each story has pictures which can be printed in black-and-white for the kids to colour in, then photograph and upload to incorporate into the story. The author, Martin Coleman, has a fantastic take on the words, and some quips and asides, such as the invention of sushi by Jonah when in the whale, or the “countryside” smell of the Prodigal son when he returns to his family!

The Pass-it-on campaign was introduced earlier this year due to the passionate belief in the power that stories have to enrich and enhance our lives, and the wish to keep the Bible alive for future generations.

Jean Orton writes: At our recent Church Council meeting the decision was made to become a Fairtrade Church. We shall be joining the other churches in Horsforth in supporting an organisation which stands for compassion and justice throughout the world. This means that:

- Fairtrade tea and coffee will be used after all services and meetings for which we have responsibility;
- we shall encourage the use of other Fairtrade products (e.g. sugar, biscuits, fruit);
- we shall promote Fairtrade during Fairtrade fortnight and during the year whenever possible.

We are sorry that for some people this may involve the sacrifice of their favourite brand of tea or coffee, and that there may be a slight increase in the cost of providing refreshments, but Fairtrade does fight against the exploitation

of buying cheap goods at the expense of others. Also as Fairtrade products are being developed, they are becoming more and more popular. Try them!

Christmas time is Carol time. There are many lovely carols. We all have our favourites and one of them begins “*I saw three ships come sailing by*”. It makes a pretty picture and one to kindle the imagination, for there are three ships which have real significance for us at this season.

The Big Brownie Birthday

2014 is a special year for Guiding. The Brownie section is celebrating its centenary.

In May 1914 the President of the Girl Guides Association, Miss Agnes Baden-Powell, announced that it had been decided to form a younger Guides’ section as younger girls were accompanying their elder sisters to meetings. Members of this new junior organisation were known as Rosebuds and their uniform for navy blue with a woolly cap and a special rosebud badge was designed for them. However, before the name of Rosebuds was settled on, the Chief Scout, Lord Baden-Powell, suggested Brownies as he believed lively youngsters would not like to be thought of rosebuds but needed a more interesting name linked with being active. B-P had read Mrs Julia Horatia Ewing’s story “Tommy and Betty and the Wise Brown Owl” and he based the ideals and ways of this new organisation on this story.



One hundred years later, members of the Grove Brownie Packs have taken part in two large scale celebrations: **Saturday 17th May**, thousands of members of Girlguiding North East England Region (an area covering from the Scottish Border to Lincolnshire) gathered at Wetherby Race Course. The event known as Star Quest had something for

everyone, including circus acts and dancing, singing, storytelling, street performers, marching bands, stage bands, a talent stage and musical theatre and the Star Quest Trail. But, because it was a hot sunny day, the longest queues were for the ice cream vans! A memorable day had by all! **Saturday 14th June**, hundreds of Brownies from throughout Leeds set off for a Stay Away event at Flamingo Land. On arrival the Brownies were taken to their caravans or to the camping field if they were staying in tents. They were eager to try every ride they could possibly manage – with the scariest rides being the most popular. There were other activities arranged, including swimming, a zoo trail (which included finding those giraffes which had been sponsored by Girlguiding Leeds) and when the rides closed, night time activities included a show, camp fire singing and disco. The closing ceremony was actually held at 9am on the Sunday morning before Flamingo Land was open to the public and the Brownies were able to enjoy the rest of the day before returning to Horsforth. An action packed weekend – certainly enjoyed by Brownies and Leaders!

Famous Methodists

Selina Hastings, Countess of Huntingdon



Go into a bookshop and you will find several children's books – notably "The Illustrated Children's Bible" by Selina Hastings. However it is not this Selina Hastings but a modern British Author who has also written award winning biographies on Nancy Mitford, Evelyn Waugh and others. She has also written a biography on her father "The Red Earl" who just happens to be The 17th Earl of Huntingdon and thus the present day Selina Hastings is a direct descendant.

This Selina Hastings was born Lady Selina Shirley, daughter of the 2nd Earl Ferris in 1707. In 1728 she married Theophilus Hastings, the 9th Earl of Huntingdon. As a result of attending many services at which George Whitefield preached, Countess Selina grew to be a devout Christian and passionate about inviting others of British nobility to hear this preacher.

In 1739, Lady Huntingdon joined the first Methodist Society in Fetter Lane, London. When her husband died in 1746 she threw in her lot with

John Wesley in the work of the Great Revival. Whitefield was also associated and he became her personal chaplain. With his assistance she founded the “Countess of Huntingdon’s Connexion”, being a movement within the Methodist Church and partly to counter problems put in her way by Anglican clergy (though she preferred not to break away from the Anglican church entirely).

She was responsible for founding 64 chapels and she contributed to the funding of others but she insisted that they all subscribe to the doctrines of the Church of England and use only the Book of Common Prayer. She appointed Ministers to officiate at these chapels in the belief that she had the power to make such appointments. Following the expulsion of six Methodist students from St Edmund Hall, Oxford, in 1768, she founded a training college near Brecon. The college later merged with Westminster College as part of Cambridge University and the training college of the Presbyterian Church of England (later United Reformed Church). It is said that she expended £100,000 in the cause of religion.

Lady Huntingdon encountered further problems between the Church of England and her works. Nevertheless she persisted and until her death in 1791, she maintained an active control over her chapels and chaplains and she even petitioned King George III and made vigorous protest against the anti-Calvinistic minutes of the Wesleyan Conference of 1770.

In her Will, she asked that there be no biography of her and it wasn’t until 90 years after her death that one was written. There were various obituaries and tributes: Horace Walpole described her as “The Patriarchess of the Methodists” and a further tribute from the Roman Catholic, John Henry Newman “She devoted herself, her means, her time, her thoughts, to the cause of Christ. She did not spend money on herself, she did not allow the homage paid to her rank to remain with herself”.

Huntingdon College in Montgomery, Alabama, is named after the Countess to honour her contributions to Methodism and Huntingdon Street in Savannah, Georgia, recognises her association with the Wesleys and their work in Georgia.

You may have seen on the news, on 16th October, a statue was unveiled in the English Football Hall of Fame at Burton on Trent, dedicated to the first professional black footballer **Arthur Wharton**.

Arthur Wharton was born in the Gold Coast in October 1865 and came to England to train as a Methodist Missionary in 1882. Sadly he soon gave up this calling in favour of becoming a full time sportsman (in 1886 he set the then world record for the 100yds – 10 seconds – at an AAA Championship). He was a keen cricketer but football was where he excelled and he played as goalkeeper (but also in outfield) at various clubs, eventually Rotherham. There he met and married Emma Lister and became a publican at the Albert Tavern, Rotherham. Sadly he developed a drink problem and had to give up football, going on to work in Edlington Colliery. He died in 1930 and was buried in an unmarked pauper's grave – though this has now been rectified by his family.
